Task 1

Task 2

Now, write your own short introduction persuading someone to visit the Zambezi river. Try to include some of your persuasive/boastful words! Also, use some of the sentence starters from the video to help you to structure your writing.

WALT: Can I create fractions bigger than 1 whole?

Yesterday we looked at how to create a whole using fractions. Remember the denominator (bottom number) and the numerators (top number) need to be the same.

Today we are going to look at when a fraction is bigger than a whole. This is when the numerator is bigger than the denominator. It has a special name called an improper fraction. We will look at this more closely tomorrow.
